## DANGER

Observe the following precautions when working on or around your IT rack system:

- Heavy equipment—personal injury or equipment damage might result if mishandled.
- Always lower the leveling pads on the rack cabinet.
- Always install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
- To avoid hazardous conditions due to uneven mechanical loading, always install the heaviest devices in the bottom of the rack cabinet. Always install servers and optional devices starting from the bottom of the rack cabinet.
- Rack-mounted devices are not to be used as shelves or work spaces. Do not place objects on top of rack-mounted devices.



- Each rack cabinet might have more than one power cord. Be sure to disconnect all power cords in the rack cabinet when directed to disconnect power during servicing.
- Connect all devices installed in a rack cabinet to power devices installed in the same rack cabinet. Do not plug a power cord from a device installed in one rack cabinet into a power device installed in a different rack cabinet.
- An electrical outlet that is not correctly wired could place hazardous voltage on the metal parts of the system or the devices that attach to the system. It is the responsibility of the customer to ensure that the outlet is correctly wired and grounded to prevent an electrical shock.

#### CAUTION

- Do not install a unit in a rack where the internal rack ambient temperatures will exceed the manufacturer's recommended ambient temperature for all your rack-mounted devices.
- Do not install a unit in a rack where the air flow is compromised. Ensure that air flow is not blocked or reduced on any side, front, or back of a unit used for air flow through the unit.
- Consideration should be given to the connection of the equipment to the supply circuit so that overloading of the circuits does not compromise the supply wiring or overcurrent protection. To provide the correct power connection to a rack, refer to the rating labels located on the equipment in the rack to determine the total power requirement of the supply circuit.
- *(For sliding drawers.)* Do not pull out or install any drawer or feature if the rack stabilizer brackets are not attached to the rack. Do not pull out more than one drawer at a time. The rack might become unstable if you pull out more than one drawer at a time.
- *(For fixed drawers.)* This drawer is a fixed drawer and must not be moved for servicing unless specified by the manufacturer. Attempting to move the drawer partially or completely out of the rack might cause the rack to become unstable or cause the drawer to fall out of the rack.

**CAUTION:**

Removing components from the upper positions in the rack cabinet improves rack stability during relocation. Follow these general guidelines whenever you relocate a populated rack cabinet within a room or building:


- Reduce the weight of the rack cabinet by removing equipment starting at the top of the rack cabinet. When possible, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. If this configuration is not known, you must observe the following precautions:
  - Remove all devices in the 32U position and above.
  - Ensure that the heaviest devices are installed in the bottom of the rack cabinet.
  - Ensure that there are no empty U-levels between devices installed in the rack cabinet below the 32U level.
- If the rack cabinet you are relocating is part of a suite of rack cabinets, detach the rack cabinet from the suite.
- Inspect the route that you plan to take to eliminate potential hazards.
- Verify that the route that you choose can support the weight of the loaded rack cabinet. Refer to the documentation that comes with your rack cabinet for the weight of a loaded rack cabinet.
- Verify that all door openings are at least 760 x 230 mm (30 x 80 in.).
- Ensure that all devices, shelves, drawers, doors, and cables are secure.
- Ensure that the four leveling pads are raised to their highest position.
- Ensure that there is no stabilizer bracket installed on the rack cabinet during movement.
- Do not use a ramp inclined at more than 10 degrees.
- When the rack cabinet is in the new location, complete the following steps:
  - Lower the four leveling pads.
  - Install stabilizer brackets on the rack cabinet.
  - If you removed any devices from the rack cabinet, repopulate the rack cabinet from the lowest position to the highest position.
- If a long-distance relocation is required, restore the rack cabinet to the configuration of the rack cabinet as you received it. Pack the rack cabinet in the original packaging material, or equivalent. Also lower the leveling pads to raise the casters off of the pallet and bolt the rack cabinet to the pallet.



## **Power and cabling information for NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE**

The following comments apply to the servers that have been designated as conforming to NEBS (Network Equipment-Building System) GR-1089-CORE:

The equipment is suitable for installation in the following:

- Network telecommunications facilities
- Locations where the NEC (National Electrical Code) applies

The intrabuilding ports of this equipment are suitable for connection to intrabuilding or unexposed wiring or cabling only. The intrabuilding ports of this equipment *must not* be metallically connected to the interfaces that connect to the OSP (outside plant) or its wiring. These interfaces are designed for use as intrabuilding interfaces only (Type 2 or Type 4 ports as described in GR-1089-CORE) and require isolation from the exposed OSP cabling. The addition of primary protectors is not sufficient protection to connect these interfaces metallically to OSP wiring.

**Note:** All Ethernet cables must be shielded and grounded at both ends.

The ac-powered system does not require the use of an external surge protection device (SPD).

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## Installing the 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure

Use this overview as a guide to the tasks required for installing the 58/88 PCI Express (PCIe) storage enclosure (EXP30 Ultra SSD I/O Drawer) into a rack and cabling it to a server.

### Procedure

You can use the following table to read about and complete the high-level tasks for installing the 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure.

## Installing the 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure: Details

The detailed installation procedure includes information from online references that are specified in the overview. You can use the expanded instructions in this procedure to install your PCIe storage enclosure into a rack and to cable it to a server.

### Before you begin

- This information is provided in printed form as a list of basic tasks for installing the 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure. For the most current version, use the online information: Installing the 5888 PCIe storage enclosure.
- This procedure supports the following installation scenarios:
  - Your 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure was delivered already mounted in a rack, and you need to complete the installation.
  - Your 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure was delivered separately from a rack, and you need to mount the enclosure in an existing rack and complete the installation.

**Note:** If the rack is not yet installed, you must first complete the procedure for Installing the rack.

- Before installing the PCIe storage enclosure into a rack, read the Rack safety notices.

### About this task

To install the 58/88 disk drive enclosure, complete the following tasks:

1. Choose the type of installation you are performing:
  - To complete the installation of a 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure that was delivered already mounted in a rack, go to step 2.
  - To complete the installation of a 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure that was delivered separately from a rack, go to step 3 on page 5.
2. Remove the shipping brackets attached at the front and rear of the PCIe storage enclosure as follows:
  - a. At the rear of the rack, find the rear panel of the 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure. Observe that the enclosure contains a power supply on each side of the unit behind the shipping bracket. Each power supply handle (**A**) is attached to a tab (**B**) of the rear shipping bracket (**C**) using an orange releasable Panduit tie wrap (**D**), as shown in the following figure.




Figure 1. Power supply attachment to the rear shipping bracket

- b. Remove one of the Panduit tie wraps (**D**) by squeezing the release on the tie wrap head (**E**), as shown in the preceding figure, and feeding the strap back through the head. Then remove the other Panduit tie wrap.
- c. Using a screwdriver, remove the two screws (**A**) that attach the rear shipping bracket (**B**) to the left and right flanges of the rack frame, as shown in the following figure. Use the screwdriver provided in the installation kit to remove the six screws (**C**) that attach the rear shipping bracket (**B**) to the rear of the PCIe storage enclosure. Lift the bracket away from the rack frame.

**Tip:** Save all of the brackets and screws that you have removed for any future reinstallation and for shipping of the 58/88 PCIe storage enclosure that might be required.




Figure 2. Removing the rear shipping bracket

- d. Dock one of the power supplies by gently sliding it into the enclosure until the orange release tab latches, as shown in the following figure. Then dock the other power supply.




Figure 3. Docking the power supply

Go to step 7 on page 13.

3. Unpack the PCIe storage enclosure as follows:


- a. Refer to the kitting list provided with the rack installation kit, and complete a parts inventory.
- b. Locate the rack-mounting hardware kit and the system rail assemblies that were included with your PCIe storage enclosure.

The rails are front-to-back and left-to-right side dependent.

4. Determine where to install the PCIe storage enclosure into the rack as follows:
  - a. Determine where in the rack to place the PCIe storage enclosure in relation to other system hardware. As you plan, keep the following steps in mind:
    - 1) Organize larger and heavier units into the lower part of the rack.
    - 2) Plan to install units into the lower part of the rack first.
    - 3) Record the EIA locations in your plan.

**Note:** The PCIe storage enclosure is one Electronic Industries Alliance (EIA) unit high. An EIA unit is 44.50 mm (1.75 in.) in height. The rack contains three mounting holes for each EIA unit of height. This enclosure, therefore, is 44.50 mm (1.75 in.) high and covers 3 mounting holes in the rack.

- b. If necessary, remove the filler panels to allow access to the inside of the rack enclosure where you plan to place the PCIe storage enclosure.

- c. If necessary, remove the front and rear rack doors.
- d. Mark the rack location where you will install the PCIe storage enclosure. Choose one of the following options:
  - 1) If you have a rack-mounting template, use it to mark the location.
  - 2) If you do not have a rack-mounting template, complete the following steps:
    - a) Face the front of the rack and work from the left side. Make a note of the EIA unit to be used for the PCIe storage enclosure. Use tape, a marker, or a pencil to mark the middle mounting hole **(A)** of the EIA unit. Place another mark beside the bottom mounting hole **(B)**. Mark the rack so that these marks can also be seen from the rear of the rack.




Figure 5. Marking the installation locations

- b) Repeat the last step to place two marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the front-right side of the rack.
- c) Go to the rear of the rack. On the left side, find the EIA unit to be used for the PCIe storage enclosure.
- d) Mark the middle mounting hole (C) of this EIA unit. Place another mark beside the bottom mounting hole (D).
- e) Repeat the last step to place two marks on the corresponding mounting holes on the rear-right side of the rack.

5. Install the rail assembly into the rack as follows:

**Important:** To complete this procedure, use two people to attach the rail assembly to the rack. Position one person in front of the rack and one person at the rear of the rack.

**CAUTION:**

**Installing the rails in the rack is a complex procedure. To install the rails correctly, you must perform each task in the following order. Failure to do so might cause rail failure and potential danger to yourself and the system unit.**

- a. Facing the front of the rack, locate the two marks made previously on the Electronic Industries Alliances (EIA) strips.

**Notes:**

- The rail installation can be completed by one person. However, the installation is easier if one person is positioned at the front of the rack and one person is positioned at the rear of the rack.
  - If hardware is located immediately below the EIA location where you are installing the rails, you can slide the hardware out to its service position to provide more work space for the installation.
- b. Select a rail. Identify the side of the rack where the rail must be mounted by holding the rail inside of the open space of the rack as follows:
    - The rail points from front to rear.




Figure 6. Mounting the rail to the front of the rack

    - The tension clip (A) points toward the front of the rack and aligns with the bottom EIA hole that you marked previously, as shown in Figure 6 on page 9.
    - The rail shaft is aligned with the inside edge of the front rack flange with its open side facing inward.
  - c. Bend the tension clip (A) up and insert it into the bottom EIA hole that you marked previously, as shown in Figure 6 on page 9. Ensure that the lip of the clip is brought fully through the hole and clasped against the bottom of the hole. Seat the alignment screw (B) in the middle EIA hole that you marked previously.

**Note:** There are two sizes of alignment screws (B). If your rack has round mounting holes, use the smaller alignment screw for each rail. If your rack has square mounting holes, use the larger

alignment screw for each rail. Alignment screws are provided with the rack installation kit.




Figure 7. Expanding the rail to the rear of the rack

- d. At the rear of the rack, locate the two marks that you made previously on the EIA strips. Compress the rail (C) as shown in Figure 7, and then expand the rail carefully toward the marks until the rail end meets the rear rack flange.




Figure 8. Mounting the rail to the rear of the rack

- e. Seat the alignment screw (D) of the rail into the middle EIA hole that you marked previously, as shown in Figure 8 on page 10.

- f. Repeat step 5c on page 8 through step 5e on page 9 for the other rail.




Figure 9. Mounting the cable management bracket

- g. At the rear of the rack, hold the cable management bracket up to the rear rack flanges, aligning the bracket mounting holes to the top holes of the EIA containing the enclosure, as shown in Figure 9. Apply the securing screws (E) through the bracket mounting holes and into the top EIA holes on the rack flanges.

**CAUTION:**

**In order to provide for the secure attachment of the rails, the securing screws (E) must be applied at the specified EIA locations even if you do not mount the cable management bracket.**

- 6. Install the PCIe storage enclosure onto the rails as follows:




Figure 10. Reviewing the enclosure attachment to the rails

- a. Before attempting to mount the PCIe storage enclosure to the rails, review Figure 10 to observe how the chassis bracket guide (A) on the side of the enclosure fits and slides into the rail sheath (B) that matches its shape.

**Note:** In Figure 10, the right rail (B) is portrayed at an angle to show the location of the rail sheath. The actual rail is mounted in an upright position in the rack.

- Attention:** Due to the precision required to align and connect these parts, you must use two people to move the enclosure. Using fewer than two people can result in damage to the enclosure.
- b. Position one person on each side of the PCIe storage enclosure and lift the enclosure. At the front of the rack, position the rear of the enclosure in front of the rails.




Figure 11. Fitting the enclosure into the rail sheath

  - c. On one side of the enclosure, insert the chassis bracket guide (A) into the rail sheath (B) opening, as shown in Figure 11. Repeat this operation on the other side.




Figure 12. Sliding the disk drive enclosure into the rack

- d. When the chassis bracket guides are firmly seated on both sides of the enclosure, slide the enclosure gently into the rack cabinet, as shown in Figure 12.

**CAUTION:**

Ensure that no one's fingers are located between the enclosure and the cable management bracket when you slide the enclosure into the rack cabinet.




Figure 13. Securing the front of the enclosure to the rack

- e. Secure the front of the enclosure to the rack flanges by applying the securing screws (A) through the top open holes in each bracket and into the top EIA holes, as shown in Figure 13.




Figure 14. Installing the power cords

- f. At the rear of the rack, install the power cables (A), as shown in Figure 14 on page 13. Use Velcro ties to secure the power cords to the cable management bracket.

7. Identify the configuration and cable requirements for adding the PCIe storage enclosure to the system.

**Note:** This enclosure uses PCIe cables to connect to the system.

- a. Identify the configuration option that you will use to add the PCIe storage enclosure to the system. The following examples provide possible configurations:
  - Connect a system that has one GX adapter to a single storage enclosure, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 15. Example of a system that has one GX adapter connected to a single storage enclosure

- Connect a system that has two GX adapters to two storage enclosures, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 16. Example of a system that has two GX adapters connected to two storage enclosures

- Connect a system that has two GX adapters to a single storage enclosure, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 17. Example of a system that has two GX adapters connected to a single storage enclosure

- Connect a system that has two GX adapters to two storage enclosures for high availability, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 18. Example of a system that has two GX adapters connected to two storage enclosures for high availability

- Connect two systems, each with a GX adapter, to a single storage enclosure for high availability, as shown in the following figure.




Figure 19. Example of two systems, each with a GX adapter, connected to a single storage enclosure for high availability

- b. Review connector information pertaining to the hardware in your configuration as follows:
      - 1) Adapter cables attach to ports at the rear of the systems in which the adapters are installed. To identify the PCIe port location for the system in your configuration, see “Connector locations” on page 19.
      - 2) Adapters are cabled to the 58/88 by using ports at the rear of the enclosure. To learn about the enclosure ports used in the following options, see “Model 58/88 connector locations” on page 21
8. Cable the PCIe storage enclosure to the system as follows:
  - a. Complete all applicable prerequisites for installing your PCIe storage enclosure. For detailed procedures related to preparing to connect your PCIe storage enclosure, see Preparing to connect your PCIe storage enclosures.
  - b. Add the PCIe storage enclosure to the system as follows:
    - 1) If the system is not already powered off, remove power from the system. For details, see Stopping a system or logical partition (<http://publib.boulder.ibm.com/infocenter/systems/scope/hw/topic/p7haj/crustopsys.htm>).
    - 2) Remove or open the rear cover of the system.
    - 3) Locate the GX adapter or adapters to which the PCIe storage enclosure will be connected.

**Note:** This procedure assumes that the GX adapter is already installed. If the GX adapter is not installed, stop now and follow the instructions that came with the GX adapter to install it. After the GX adapter is installed, continue with the steps in this procedure to connect the PCI storage enclosure.

    - 4) Using PCIe cables, connect the PCIe storage enclosure to the GX adapters identified in step 8b3.

**Note:** If you are connecting a PCIe cable to an unused PCIe connector that is covered with a plastic or metal clip, remove the clip before installing the PCIe cable.

    - ii. Type `diag -d sysplanar0 -E xx` and press Enter, where `xx` is a number 1 - 60 that specifies a number of days. This command returns results for the most recent number of days specified. The suggested range is 30 days.
    - iii. On the DIAGNOSTIC MODE SELECTION display, highlight the **Problem Determination** option, and press Enter.
    - iv. Continue with step 8b8b.
  - If your system is not managed by an HMC or SDMC and has a partition running the Linux operating system, complete the following steps:
    - i. Log in as the root user. If you need assistance, contact the system administrator.




Figure 20. Model 02E/4C connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 21. Model 05E/6C connector locations on a rack-mounted model




Figure 22. Model 31E/1C or 31E/2C showing all 12X connector locations




Figure 23. Model 31E/1C or 31E/2C showing all PCIe connector locations




Figure 24. Model 58/88 connector locations
